Abstract

3 The Universe Metaphor

- **Universes** (galaxies) are the largest statements: sweeping, rare, and distinct.

This metaphor creates a language. People can say, “I launched a star,” or “This planet is ours.” It builds identity without requiring technical knowledge. It allows communities to speak about belonging in a shared, poetic way.

4 How It Works (A Gentle Summary)

The platform is simple in spirit. A user chooses a celestial slot. They launch a token tied to that slot. The slot can never be claimed again. The token becomes a permanent planet in the shared universe.

Behind the scenes, the system ensures that each slot can only be used once, and that the universe updates live. But the goal is not to foreground the machinery. The goal is to make the experience feel clear, beautiful, and honest.
